

On May 2, Justice in Action will hold our second annual Nehemiah Action Assembly. It is a gathering of the masses with the goal of holding our local leaders accountable to just practices and policies. But it isn't always so clear what justice looks like in the scope of our world. Is it punishment for bad deeds? We like to say we 'bring people to justice.' Is it providing safety for the community? These would be, in part, the purpose of the criminal justice system. But perhaps justice means something more.

Within the context of faith, justice is tied to God. From God's covenant with Noah and Abraham to the Ten Commandments given to Moses, God's aim for all of humanity is abundant life—for all of God's people. The prophets liken justice to water. Water can be both destructive and nurturing. Do we let justice flow like streams, or do we use it like a dam—holding it for some and denying it to others?

Biblically, justice is always about restoring life. The Year of Jubilee was supposed to take place every 50 years, restoring land lost to debt and releasing those who had been enslaved. "Every person got back their original family holding. Families that had lost their land because of poverty or back luck would have it returned. It was a periodic reboot of the economy, correcting for the inevitable overconcentration of wealth in the hands of a few."¹ It even meant allowing all the land to lie fallow, allowing it to rest.

It was a Sabbath. A restoration of life and nourishment. A much-needed break. Even the weekly day of rest is an act of justice. It is liberation from the demands of work so that one may eat and breathe and live freely. It is a step back from the "scaffolding of institutional structures of domination and control."

Biblically, justice is about lifting up the vulnerable and caring for the stranger. It is hospitality and hope. It is an opportunity for life. Weigh that approach to justice with how society practices justice. Punitive. Value-based. Financially driven. We can do better.


When Nehemiah recognized how justice had been perverted, he called the people to gather and hold the leaders accountable to a better way. On May 2, we challenge our own leaders to create a path to a better way. We have heard the stories of our people—stories of worry about housing; stories that share the difficulties of mental healthcare access; stories that desire another chance at life for those facing jail. We have a responsibility to seek practices that promote abundant life for all of God's people. I hope you will join Our Saviour's and the 24 other faith communities and hundreds of citizens in calling for justice in May.


